## **Strategic Highlights**

ACAP continued to adjust to the changing environment exacerbated by lingering COVID concerns in 2021. Programmatic adjustments to enhance safety remained the rule of thumb. Most members returned to in-person programming after COVID vaccinations were distributed, and ACAP retired our virtual program to prioritize on-site services.

### **Financial Highlights**

ACAP created a recovery plan based on increasing member participation, but it was slow going because of ongoing safety concerns. Additional government loans and grants helped us navigate the slower rebound and challenging staffing environment. Our budget reflected the likelihood of significant loss at the beginning of the year; yet, because of government and donor support, including two big donations from an anonymous donor, we ended the year in the black.

## **Operating Highlights**

ACAP worked to rebalance the new safety demands and other COVID-era changes with a smaller staff. We acquired important safety equipment for transfers and were the recipients of a state-of-the-art electric wheelchair bike and trailer.

## **Looking Ahead**

ACAP was cautiously hopeful that 2022 would see us returning to our traditional program model and perhaps our trajectory of growth. The shadow of COVID, however, remained.

## FINANCIAL SUMMARY

ACAP's budget for 2021 predicted significant loss, with COVID still overshadowing American life and no vaccine available at the beginning of the year. ACAP membership was still down at the start of the year, at about 2/3 of pre-COVID levels. However, against these dark predictors, ACAP's friends came through for us in a big way. The most transformative gifts came from a major anonymous donor to ACAP, who gave gifts totaling \$200,000 in 2021. Our second major donor made gifts under sad circumstances. COVID brought hardship to many nonprofits, some of which had to shut their doors in 2021. One of these organizations was longtime ACAP partner The Caring Place, though which ACAP had volunteered in a Meals-on-Wheels program. Sadly, The Caring Place closed in 2021, but ACAP was grateful to receive gifts totaling \$67,700 from the organization and its fundraising group, Friends of the Caring Place. ACAP also received an additional Paycheck Protection Program loan of \$146,000 in early 2021. All of this support helped offset lower enrollment and the inability to hold our usual fundraisers, Theme Table Event and Bowl-a-Thon.

- ACAP received extra payments of \$16,919 from Community Care.
- The 2<sup>nd</sup> ACAP-tivating Event brought in more than \$13,000.
- Tom & Diane Schaitel donated a total of \$11,000 to ACAP.
- The Evan & Marion Helfaer Foundation granted ACAP \$9000 for arts programs.



## **NOTEWORTHY AT ACAP**

### **Venturing Out in a Changing Environment**

At the height of the winter wave of COVID, the first vaccines were distributed. ACAP staff were among those with early access. ACAP urged its members to be vaccinated (and eventually boosted) to protect themselves and fellow ACAP members as much as possible.

With spring came a breath of hope as COVID cases decreased nationwide, and ACAP began to tentatively venture back out into the community. The challenge at this time was finding partners and opportunities; many partners had closed or changed their procedures in light of safety concerns. ACAP was able to revitalize some of our oldest partnerships (i.e., Retzer Nature Center and the YMCA), while also adding new partners (Journey Martial Arts), all while keeping safety in the forefront.

The impact of COVD variants like Omicron derailed hopes for a return to normalcy over the summer, and ACAP continued to adjust to changing

recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and local health officials. Summer in Wisconsin brings wonderful weather, and ACAP members maximized our time outdoors, which helped allay COVID risk. In the fall of 2021, ACAP was able to hold a few public events, including a PlayMakers "Show of Shows" and the Dan Campbell Memorial Art Exhibit at Art Links, but with the return of winter and more time together indoors, we elected to keep things safer by minimizing events.
